<p>Technological subsystem Material objects, together with the techniques of their use. Tools and weapons.</p>	<p>Artifacts Material objects, together with the techniques of their use. Tools and weapons.</p>
<p>Sociological subsystem Sum of those accepted and expected patterns of interpersonal relations that find their outlet in economic, political, military, religious, kinship and other associations.</p>	<p>Sociofacts Define the social organization of culture.</p>
